In May 2015 a friend and I arranged a 12 day holiday in Japan. I had not given much thought previously to visiting this country, but I am glad now to have done so. Despite broad differences between our two cultures and so many apparent contradictions, much was an eye-opener for Australian eyes – absence of graffiti and rubbish, courtesy (train conductors even bow as they enter and leave a carriage), extraordinary public transport system (bullet trains a must-do experience, and myriad subways in the large cities), population size (127,000,000), work ethic, architectural achievements, and religious/spiritual observance.

We began in Tokyo, the largest city (pop. 35,000,000), then to Kanazawa (500,000), Kyoto (1,500,000), Hiroshima (1,120,000) and Osaka (2,872,000), only skimming the surface of such a fascinating society.

The religious/philosophical “affiliations” of Japanese include Buddhism, Shintoism and Confucianism. All three often combine in a syncretic and practical manner, with worshippers seeking assistance from gods and spirits for success in business, school exams, good health, and so on. Temples and shrines proliferate and in cities are frequented by large crowds of adherents, as well as gawking tourists. The grounds of the Golden Pavilion in Kyoto were so packed with visitors, including groups of local school children, that forward movement was almost impossible. As in European churches, visitors are requested not to take photographs at the most sacred spots or during “services.” Printed prayers are bought and left at appointed places, with incense constantly burning. Fortune tokens are also on sale. And not unlike famous European shrines,

religious trinkets and souvenirs are usually on sale nearby. A long street of market stalls (clothing, biscuits, chocolates, souvenirs) led to the gates of one of Tokyo’s most famous shrines, the Senso-ji Buddhist Temple.

## Induction Bishop John Keep

### An Associate Priest for the Parish of St Andrew

John Keep and his wife Valorie, both grew up in Sydney, NSW, where in early infancy he was brought to the font in All Saints Church, Parramatta, and subsequently confirmed at an Anglican school while Valorie was baptised by her uncle who was then Rector of Vaucluse. In short, John and Valorie have been associated with Anglicanism from early childhood. Yet it was not mere familiarity which they valued, but the orthodox merits of common language, fixed liturgy and so on.

So when they met and married it was naturally at an Anglican parish which they continued to attend until it became sadly affected by liberalism, culminating in the, as was supposed, ordination of women.

On Lady Day 1989 a meeting was held at the YWCA Centre to form a Continuing Anglican parish and the first Mass was said in the evening of 4 May, that being Ascension Day. So it was that they, as the saying goes, “left nothing, joined nothing but continued”.

John was made a deacon on 24 September 1994 and on 25 November 1995 at King Charles the Martyr Church in the Parish of The Ascension, Padstow, NSW, he was ordained a priest in the Anglican Catholic Church by the late Bishop Albert Haley.

He and Valorie moved to Perth in 1996. Later that year they left the ACCA and became members of The Traditional Church of England.

On 27 September 2003 Fr John was consecrated a Suffragan Bishop of the Traditional Church of England at St George’s Pro-Cathedral, Windlesham, Surrey, and for many years he, with Valorie’s support, provided traditional Anglican worship at St Columba’s Chapel in Armadale, Western Australia.

Bishop Michael has licensed Bishop John as an Associate Priest for the Parish of St Andrew, Lesmurdie, and at the end of Evensong on Trinity Sunday the Regional Dean, Prebendary Robert Burn formally inducted Bishop John into his office on behalf of the Bishop.

On behalf of the Churchwardens and parishioners of Saint Andrew’s, Churchwarden Mary Hoffman welcomed Bishop John as an Associate Priest for the parish and assured him of their prayers and support in his ministry.

After the service Bishop John and the congregation enjoyed some refreshments.
